Verb It Up! Bingo combines aspects of a board game and a bingo game. Each of the six bingo boards features sequences for four unique verbs. As a result, no player conjugates the same verbs as other players. Instead of the calling cards associated with traditional bingo games, players select verb tense draw cards to begin game play. An easily identifiable icon represents each verb tense both on the draw cards and the bingo boards.

Once a verb tense card is selected, the player chooses one of the four illustrations in that category on his or her bingo board. By allowing the student to choose the verb he or she wants to conjugate, the game helps develop higher-level thinking and strategy skills. Some students will choose verbs they are confident they can identify and use in a sentence. Other students will learn to choose verbs that are in a position that will allow them to progress toward winning the game.

Prompting Questions: To help students successfully play the game, each draw card includes a question that prompts usage of the correct verb tense. Questions include: Future Tense: What will the ______ do? Present Tense: What does/do the ______ do? Present with Helping Verb: What is/are the ______ doing? Past Tense: What did the ______ do?

Game facilitators are encouraged to tailor the questions to the illustration selected by the player, filling in the appropriate subject and prompting use of correct subject-verb agreement. Examples of questions and prompts are included on pages 10 and 11.

Take-Home Component: To help students prepare for the game and to encourage skills reinforcement at home, reproducible study sheets are included on pages 14–19. A reproducible letter explaining how parents and guardians can use the study sheets with their children is included on page 13. Study sheets should be sent home before the game is played. This visual study method gives the students and their parents a fun way to study the verb forms. Additionally, preparing to play the game will help the students build self-confidence that will translate to success during game play.

Wide Range of Uses and Implications: This easy-to-play game is effective in many teaching settings, including reading, writing, language arts, resource, ESOL, and speech and language classrooms. Practicing using verb tenses and subject-verb agreement will help students build their vocabulary and become more effective communicators.

HOW TO PLAY

Game Setup: Distribute a bingo board and several bingo chips to each student. Place the shuffled draw cards on a flat surface. Determine which student will take the first turn. Play will continue in a clockwise order after the first player's turn.

Bingo Variations: The object of the game is for a player to cover squares on his or her bingo board to complete a designated pattern. Traditional bingo includes covering squares across, down, or diagonally or covering every square on the board. Some other options include the following: four corners, in which the four corner squares are covered; *L*-shaped, in which the far left column and the bottom row are covered; and two-way, in which any row and any column are covered. Tell the students which type of bingo they will be playing before the game begins.

Individual, Partner, or Small-Group Play: With each bingo board, students can play individually, in pairs, or in small groups. If students play in pairs or small groups, instruct them to take turns drawing a card. Allow the partners or group members to consult with each other before giving an answer.

Game Play: The first step in a player's turn is to choose a draw card from the top of the deck. If the player selects a particular verb tense card, then the player chooses an

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uncovered picture that is in that category on his or her bingo board. If a player selects a "Choose Any Category" card, then the player may select any uncovered picture on his or her board. When playing *L*-shaped or two-way bingo, a player who selects a draw card with a verb tense category that has no uncovered squares on his or her bingo board may select another draw card.

Once a player selects a picture, he or she should answer the question on the draw card using the correct form of the verb. Depending upon the level of the student, he or she may give just the verb form as the answer or may give a complete sentence with a subject and verb form as the answer. If the player successfully answers the question, he or she should place a chip on that square. The player then returns the draw card to the bottom of the deck, and play passes to the player on the left.

Answer Key: The answers are included on pages 22 and 23. The verb form is the most important part of the answer and should not vary; however, the subject of the sentence may be changed to any appropriate noun or pronoun. Accept any reasonable subject.

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Answer Key

Determining The Winner: The first player to successfully "Bingo," according to the type of bingo game being played, is called the winner.

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
